## The Most Holy Trinity, Year A, 4th June 2023



A God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness

Today we celebrate the mystery of the Trinity: one God in three persons. God is the Lover (Father, Creator), the Beloved (Son, Saviour), and the Love which flows between them (Holy Spirit, Counsellor). Our readings help us see who God is, and what God does for us.

Moses's obedience and humility are revealed as he calls on God from the top of Mount Sinai (First

**Reading)**, pleading for the headstrong people of Israel. In responding, the Lord describes himself as 'a God of tenderness and compassion, slow to anger, rich in kindness and faithfulness'.

In the **Gospel**, Jesus tells Nicodemus of the overwhelming love God has for the world in sending his Son to be its Saviour. Through Jesus's death and resurrection, we are given the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Paul's wish for the discordant Corinthians (**Second Reading**) is peace, unity, fellowship and love. Paul encourages them (and us) to reveal the qualities of God seen in Jesus, gifted to us through the Holy Spirit, and gifted to others through our behaviour.

The **Psalm**, taken from the book of Daniel, gives praise and glory to God, exalting him above all forever.

Rublev's famous icon above, suggests the love the Holy Trinity has for us in the humility, harmony and mutual love of the three persons. I notice the space at the front of the table inviting me to share in this love and life. In thanksgiving, let's pray St Paul's blessing this week, that 'the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all'.

## **REFLECTION**


We continue our transition back into Ordinary Time by meditating on the Trinity, the mystery awaiting us on the other side of Lent and Easter. This great mystery—the divine reality of three-in-one—lies beyond the shore of reason. According to Augustine, if we think we understand it, then what we understand is not God. What we can know about the Trinity, we know through relationships. The Trinity is the powerful God coming in a cloud to form a covenant with Israel. It is the gift of divinity embodied in Jesus Christ, who comes to embrace the world. And it is the Spirit permeating all things.

After the Israelites' grave misstep while camped near Mount Sinai—their violation of the covenant through the creation of an idol—Moses pleads with God to forgive them and inherit them again as God's treasured people. This story is our own, reminding us that God is compassionate and ever-forgiving, "slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity." God is always present among us and between us, drawing us into relationship.

As Christians, we experience this relationship through the Trinity, which theologians have likened to a "dance" or "choreography" (Greek perichōrēsis). The Trinity dances in and around us, pulling us into the divine embrace through the greatness of God, the humanity of the Son, and the Spirit that breathes us into union.

The Trinity calls us tirelessly to join this dance through our own relationships and commitments—to be present among and between others, and to seek always to be compassionate, faithful, and forgiving.
